Workshop on Sustainable Development for school teachers and students organised by the German Commission, UNESCO

A 5-day workshop was organised by the German Commission of UNESCO at Hotel Raviz, Kollam which was attended by teachers and students from six schools in Germany along with selected schools of India. Trivandrum International School was represented by Ms. Rajani Roy, AshlinAji of 9 IG B and MariyamIfhamSabig of 9 IG A. The National Coordinator of German Commission, UNESCO, Mr. Heinz-JurgenRickert planned this workshop on Sustainable Development and organized interactive sessions for the students and teachers on topics like "Energy for all – a Utopia?", "Traditions – obstacles for the intercultural dialogue?", "Consumption – my personal responsibility for climate change" and "Global Citizenship – the key to a better future?".

The Germans and the Indians exchanged their viewpoints on all these topics and realized that most of the problems are common in both the countries and though we speak different languages, it is possible to find a solution that will work in both the nations.

The students worked on a scenic installation called "Fail and Hope" in which they performed a play in mime through which they showed how nations play politics with serious problems of the world like the overcrowding of refugees in Germany. The play was part of the concluding ceremony of the workshop which was hosted by the Trivandrum International School.

A trip to MitraNiketan, a non-profit educational institute was also organized as part of the workshop.

This year's Round Square International Conference was themed "The journey that makes us," and as the conference progressed, I came to realize how aptly named it was.. When I walked into Trivandrum International Airport the night of October 8th, dragging my suitcase with slight trepidations, I began my own personal journey; small, yet moving.



After a (rather uneventful) flight to

Dubai, we boarded the six-hour-flight to Geneva, where Kannan

and I conversed in jittery voices as Ms. Rupa rested. After leaving the airport with pockets full of Swiss Francs, we took a cab to Geneva Hostel where we would stay the night. There, we met the delegation from Mayo College. The next day, after a train ride to Aigle, we boarded a bus to get to Aiglon College; the IB school where the conference was being conducted.

Every day of the conference promised something new for us, starting with the Opening Ceremony, where I carried our flag to be displayed; the keynote speakers enthralled us, the activities thrilled us, and the people we met stimulated our minds. We listened to Sir Jackie Stewart, Formula One racing champion; Mark Grist, poet and rap battle enthusiast; Meagan Fallone and Alessandra Morelli, two highly successful feminists; a panel of three "Aiglonian" alumni; Liz Turner, a self-made woman who looked past her setbacks; Ben Saunders, polar explorer; Peter Charaf, ocean conservationist; Koome Gikunda, another alumnus; and finally, Nick Howes and Col. Al Worden, to speak of the stars and the beyond. With each speaker, we shared struggles and triumphs; sorrows and lessons; we would discuss these in our frequent baraza meetings. Between these meetings, we roamed around campus or into the village, or relax in our rooms back at our houses. Cultural rehearsals were arranged for us, and we chose

an IDEALS activity each; Kannan and I were tasked with footpath service, in which we lightened the load of the forestry department by two months, restoring the jogging path. We watched a local hockey game (team Villars-sur-Ollon!), ignoring the freezing cold, staring open-mouthed at the battered puck gliding over the ice. After the Closing Ceremony, in which I carried our flag back, we performed AR Rahman's "Vande Mataram," "Thai Manne Vanakkam" for the Cultural Night, and we watched our new friends share their heritage as well. Following the End of Conference Dance were a few goodbyes, and the next morning, we returned to Geneva Hostel to spend a day before our flight.

The thing about experience is that it's both extremely easy and hard to gain. Every moment in a new environment simultaneously educates you a bit more about the world instantly, and makes you work to understand it. I learned how to be independent; how to handle unfamiliar situations on my own, take care of myself, and interact with an incredibly diverse selection of students. I feel more prepared for university life; I've been introduced to new possibilities; and in the mix, I've brushed up on my French. I've learned of other's experiences, and figured out how to apply them myself.

Technically, this journey was just a school trip. But it made me rethink many aspects of my life, however minute. This may seem cliché, but I really did comprehend the link between the IDEALS; responsibility. I've seen how much more there is for me to see. When it comes to Round Square conferences, whether you attend one or ten, each will be something special, and change you. They are all small journeys which make the greater you.


Our INME campus was near the TONS river and it was a lovely one situated on a flat grass ground right next to the TONS river and surrounded by mountains on all the sides.
