

The topics ranged from the different parts of the human body, sense organs, food and healthy lifestyle and the interdependence of organ systems.

ISRO Visit

ISRO is a Indian Government funded organization to do research on space that is astronomy and to be pioneers in aeronautics. VSSC is another organization involved in the cosmos research.

In mid July of 2012, Trins arranged a field trip to the ISRO rocket launching station at Thumba for the students of classes 8, 9 and 11. Two well-sized air conditioned buses were utilized for this endeavour. The trip started from Trins at about 8.45 am and reached the station at 10.30. There was a small wait and respite for the students and teachers for about half an hour and after that the rocket was launched. Everyone watched spellbound as the rocket rose forty thousand feet into the air. It was a weather rocket and it split into two stages at the pre-decided heights. This sort of launch is practiced only on the third Wednesday of a month.

The rockets are about half the size of a junction flood-light and are powered by solid fuels. The trail of smoke can be seen due to the production of quantum of ash. ISRO aims to improve its aeronautic efficiency so that even greater achievements can be carried out in the future.


All Kerala Inter-School Quiz Contest

We hope to gain not only the experience of teaching, but also learn how to be better human beings..


